"Truly He taught us to love one another. His law is love, and His gospel is peace." For more than thirty years, it was a tradition for me to sing O HOLY NIGHT for the Christmas Eve Communion meditation. My mother was the organist at our church, St. Williams, where I began to cantor when I was in the 7th Grade. We always had three Masses on Christmas Eve and mom and I "worked" all three and it was easily my favorite night of the year.

Throughout High School and college, I sang in every ensemble the schools had to offer. We started practicing our Christmas music in September so, by the time Christmas came around I was all caroled out. However, I always looked forward to Christmas Eve and the tradition of spending time with my mom, making music. It was always a special ending to a very busy season of performing.

My Mom suffered a stroke a few years after I graduated from college and lost the ability to play the organ and piano. I only went back to St. William's for Christmas once after her stroke. The new organist asked me to sing O HOLY NIGHT, and I did, but it wasn't the same. It was much harder to sing with my mom watching me from her pew and not sitting next to me at the piano.

I did go on to sing O HOLY NIGHT for many years at other churches and it was a sweet reminder of the special tradition mom and I had shared. When I worked with Fr. William Hahn, he once told a seminarian, "It's not Christmas until Valerie sings O HOLY NIGHT." He repeated that story at mom's funeral, at St. William's, where the tradition had started so many years before. I pray you each have a blessed Christmas filled with love, laughter and good music. Make all the memories and remember your loved ones celebrating Christmas with Jesus.

The Season of Christmas has always been my favorite time of year. There is something magical in the air - the sights and sounds, the joy and laughter, the spirit of generosity and goodness, as well as spending time with loved ones. As a child, my parents thought of creative ways to teach me (and my 4 younger sisters) about the true meaning of Christmas; this preparation began with Advent. Our home was decorated in pinks and purples, our kitchen cabinets were covered with words chosen by each of my family members representing what Advent meant to us - LOVE, JOY, EXPECT, AWAIT, REPENT, PREPARE and REBIRTH. During our Advent wreath prayer time, we took turns lighting candles, reading the daily reflection and story of Christmas, opening the daily door on our Advent calendar, and pulling a link from the "good deed" paper chain counting down to Christmas. Once completed, we wrote our good deed on a yellow construction paper star and hung it on the closet door to remind us that Christmas isn't about the presents we receive, but about offering our gifts of service to Jesus. And the Word became Flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth; we have beheld His glory, glory as of the only Son from the father. ~ John 1:14. At the Incarnation, God offered His most precious gift by sending His only Son as a pure baby in a manger; the Eucharist is a visual reminder of His gift to us. "St. John Chrysostom in the 4th century encouraged his congregation to attend Mass on Christmas Day, where they could approach the altar as if they were going to the manger. For if we approach with faith, we shall surely behold Him lying in a manger. His holy table will supply the place of a manger. For there will be spread the body of our Lord, not wrapped in swaddling clothes as then, but on all sides surrounded by His Holy Spirit." Quoted from "The Eucharistic Symbolism of the Manger" by Philip Kosloski. God continues to offer the very gift of Himself every time we receive His precious Body and Blood in the Eucharist. As we continue the Eucharistic Revival here in our parish, I invite you to focus on Christ and His real presence to us in the Eucharist. Mary proclaimed her "Yes" to God and became the holy dwelling place for the child Jesus. Each time we receive the Eucharist, we offer our "Yes" by proclaiming "Amen! I do believe." My Christmas memories as a young girl: I remember being in the church Christmas play. I was a star and memorizing my lines and wearing this silver star made from Reynolds Wrap foil. Believe it or not, I still have a picture of me wearing that star on my head.

Going to Christmas Eve service was and has always been a huge part of my life. On the way out of Christmas Eve service, the ushers would hand out small white bags filled with Christmas candy. I would always save the candy that I wasn't too fond of and say, "I'll eat that later," always pretending that I liked it but those chocolate drops were just too sweet!

I loved to watch the Christmas movies on the Early Show with Flippo the Clown (as fate would have it, I later would become Jr. High School friends with Flippo's daughter and remain friends through high school and now see her at our class reunions) and this one December evening as I was watching out the window waiting for my mother to come home from work, The Bells of St. Mary's (which is now my favorite Christmas movie) was playing. I would keep going to the window to see if my mother was coming yet. I could always tell when she was coming up the street as she wore this black velvet coat with one button at the neck, three-quarter in length, and it would stand out against the white snow. We had lots of snow in those days back in the sixties. It was only my mother and I when I was growing up. We would get invited every Christmas Eve to one of my mother's friends' houses she worked with in the baby department at Lazarus Department store downtown. Ruth and her husband Walter treated us as family. We had no vehicle so Mr. Davis, as I called him, would pick us up and on the way home he would always take the long way home so I could see the Christmas lights on people's homes. We continued to visit every Christmas Eve including the first year that I met my husband. This would be the last Christmas Eve we would spend time together as their son married and the nieces and nephews had other commitments. When I think of Christmases that have passed and the ones who are not with us anymore it brings tears to my eyes. May each and every one of you have a Merry Christmas this year and hold your loved ones in your heart until we are all united together with Jesus.

One of my earliest childhood memories of Christmas is of how my family would always get a live Christmas tree and set it up in our living room. Since I was one of the youngest/smallest (#7 out of 8 kids and I am 4 minutes older than my twin sister) my job was to water the Christmas tree since I could fit under it. We would set up our Nativity Scene, which was a homemade manger scene with twigs for a fence around it and reeds for a roof, under the tree. We would also decorate the tree with small multi-colored lights, ornaments, and tinsel.

I used to love to lay on the living room floor with all the lights off and "squint" at the lit Christmas tree to make the Christmas tree "glow."

One thing that I would always do is make sure one small Christmas tree light, usually white, would stick through the top of the red roof so that it lit up baby Jesus, Mary and Joseph along with the cow, donkey and sheep that were in there with them.

I am not sure that as a child I contemplated the true meaning of Christmas as I gazed upon the Nativity Scene, but I knew that I liked looking at it a lot. Now I can reflect on this miraculous event that captures the essence of Christ's humble birth in that stable in Bethlehem.

It reminds me of the power of faith, as Mary and Joseph trusted in God's plan despite the challenges that they faced. And it emphasizes the significance of God's love for us and how Jesus' birth brings hope and redemption to a broken world.

We are all loved by God, we are worthwhile! Christmas means that we are very worthwhile in God's eyes. For all our bruises and our failures and our sins, and whether we are regulars or irregulars in our faith and at Sunday worship, we are called by God and we are the beloved of God. You and I, dear friends, are worth the Christmas that God's love makes possible for us. That is what the infant in the manger is telling each one of us this blessed Christmas Day!

So, go and squint at your lit Christmas tree and ponder baby Jesus' love!

Merry Christmas! Deacon Joe Knapke In the Nativity scene at my childhood home, Jesus was a fixture – and not just metaphorically. He was made of a piece of plaster, laid in a straw-filled crib he rested in, and securely fastened to the middle of the little wooden shack that sheltered him. We would then place it under the Christmas tree.

Christmas is a time of joy, but all too often it is a manufactured joy, made up of food, gifts, decorations, cards, family visits, special outfits, indulgent confection, and spectacular messes of gift wrap and dirty dishes.

For me, Christmas was attending Masses – many times, Midnight Mass. As early as five years old, I remember entering church with all of the beautiful flowers and calm, and the peace of the Nativity Set where I always went to kneel down to pray to baby Jesus.

Before you get caught up in the madness that is Christmas in America, take a few minutes to remember who Jesus was, and what He was about. This something St. Francis never forgot. Yes, this is one part of why I became a Secular Franciscan.

This Christmas, make sure that Jesus is the reason for your season, so that when He's in His crib on Christmas morning, He'll look right at home.

This Christmas, let's remember that who you are matters far more than what we do. In the creche, Mary is not braiding the straw into garland, she is simply present and prayerful.

A lot of our traditions at Christmas center around family, and this can be the source of as much headache and frustration as joy. We must find a way to be the men and women God created us to be, and to encourage and respect that same struggle in everyone around us. This Christmas, celebrate the uniqueness of each person in your life and do so in your unique way.

Saint Franics' desire to be like Jesus in every way extended to his desire to suffer the wounds of the cross. In the same way, our faith should make a permanent mark on who we are and how we behave. If our Christianity is nothing more than a weekend get-together or a box checked on a survey, it is no faith at all. We must find a way to imitate Jesus in our own time and place, and in our own way.

The question we must ask ourselves is not so much, "What would Jesus do?" but "What should I, as a follower of Jesus, do?"

This Christmas, let the angels remind you of the great change that Christ makes in your life, and let that change shine through in everything you do. I suggest this Christmas, step outside your four walls. Take a walk in the snow, have a romp with a puppy, feed the birds, or marvel at the stars. Remember that the world God created for you is quite a bit nicer than the one you've created for yourself.


